Furniture/Decorating

hen meeting with professionals at the Ohio Design Centre, located right here in Beachwood on Mercantile Road, we learned that six of their eight showrooms are open to the public. The other two are open for browsing, although a decorator is required to make purchases. Angela Williams, account coordinator for Studiothink, the center's marketing company, is working hard to get the word out that the ODC is open to the public and that if a buyer wants to use a decorator and doesn't have one, he or she can be matched up with one.

While talking with Lisa Kuenning at Donghia, she told us that wall coverings are making a huge comeback this year and are being used throughout the home.

With a resurgence in natural and innovative options, they offer a wide selection of woven fibers, hemp, grasscloth, fabric, foam, wood, mother of pearl, magnetic and even 3D hologram papers from which to choose. Since many of these papers are works of art, clients often choose to use them for feature walls, panels and something special to hang on their walls.

"It's not the wallpaper you think of when thinking from the past," Kuenning said. "We still have that, but what we have today is a lot more innovative."

In lighting, the trends are energy efficiency and LED lighting. What makes lighting interesting is the use of blended materials, like glass and metal, leather and metal or wood and metal. Lighting can create a statement and be seen as jewelry for the room.

Representatives from all showrooms agree that warmer tones, texture and depth are being used in furniture. While neutral tones will always be popular, beautiful, rich colors that can be used as an accent or theme are hot this spring. Textural fabrics, exotic woods and warm metals are combined to make stunning

pieces. Traditional, contemporary and reclaimed furniture, also know as shabby sheik or urban sheik, are popular choices when it comes to style.

Window treatments are also making a huge comeback. Fabric choices are limitless, as is drapery hardware. Acrylic can be bent around corners; and finials are made of crystal, metal, or painted materials. Drapery ties also decorate a room.

Ann Monroe of A.E. Monroe & Company showed us various performance fabrics that just came out this spring. These beautiful options withhold sun, don't fade or hold water, and are mold and mildew resistant. With bright, bold colors across the board, there are many prints available, with traditional and southwestern prints being popular. Like wallpaper, these fabrics are not like the outdoor fabrics seen in the past. The plush feel and textures allow for many more options when designing outdoor furniture.

Monroe also told us that her outdoor carpet line is more commercial, without a commercial look.

When talking with Thom Capretta of Atelier Lapchi, he shared that rug trends are an entity of their own that don't necessarily follow fashion furniture trends. As with furniture, he's seeing big colors as well as black, gray and taupe. His custom-designed rugs are created with hand-dyed wool and silk, and when asked what's hot, Capretta said it must be hardwood floors since he's selling larger rugs. As far as style, he showed us transitional designs that can be used to pull in a contemporary or traditional look.

At Bello Design, a more contemporary showroom, designer Laurie Lindbloom told us people are getting more comfortable with a style that incorporates clean lines, a mix of different materials and an overall look that is not so matchy matchy. Even those who are more comfortable with more traditional homes will welcome a contemporary table, lamp or fixture to add a little bling. About animal prints? They're classic and will be used forever.

When asked what's hot, Saule Narabutaitis, Bello Design assistant manager, said bold is in. Large art is in. Recycling is in and clean lines are in. "What's really in depends on the space, style and needs of a client," she said.



Furniture

o get another perspective on furniture trends, we talked with Joseph Kogan, owner of MC Furniture in Willoughby, who told us the demographic of those who favor contemporary furniture has doubled from 8% to 16% over the past few years.

When asked what's hot, Kogan told us that espresso wood finishes are big, and a lot of furniture with walnut wood is now being shown. And, he said, "Very bright colors!"

He also favors Scandinavian designs because of their simple forms, clean lines, unbeatable craftsmanship and timeless elegance; as well as their combined use of materials, like natural woods and leather or fabrics.

Kogan said that contemporary hand-crafted furniture from Italy, Canada, France and the United States is hot. He also agrees that clean lines are in and that individual tastes tie in with styles that create peace, elegance and harmony.

Kogan realizes that not everybody has a high-limit budget and guarantees the lowest prices for the merchandise he sells everyday.

"What's hot is being able to affordably and tastefully decorate your home while staying within your budget," he said.

Outdoor Lighting

Ith the snow melting and ground thawing, it's time to think about outdoor lighting. The three reasons to consider outdoor lighting are safety, security and ambiance. When asked what's hot this year, Chris Ursetti of Liberty Landscape Lighting said it's definitely the LED lighting that's available now.

"Technology is really good. The bulbs look like halogen lights, don't have the blue tint anymore and reduce electric use by 70%," Ursetti told us. "A 50-watt spotlight only uses 9 watts of electricity."



Along with this technolo-

gy comes new products that enhance the lighting. Copper and brass are in, and Ursetti said that his products have a lifetime guarantee and add value to your home.

"All the way around, outdoor lighting provides a win win situation," Ursetti said.

Tile

hen talking with Lori Kirk-Rolley, vice president, brand marketing, at Dal-Tile Corporation, to see what's trending in tile, she told us that wood looks are clearly among the hottest trends in the marketplace. The use of tile that emulates wood, in long, linear plank sizes, continues to gain momentum in both floor and wall applications. What was first introduced as a traditional take on hardwood floors has evolved to include more colors and textures to choose from than ever before. Porcelain tile that realistically mimics the look of hardwoods allows for beauty, long-lasting durability and ease of maintenance.

Here are some additional trends expected to be seen throughout 2015:

- Gray will continue to be the hottest color in 2015. Clay, taupe and other neutrals, including soft blacks, will start to rival gray's popularity.
- Pastel blues and greens, as well as peach, coral and purple, are popular choices as accent colors. Marsala, PANTONE's 2015 Color of the Year, will also be in high demand as the industry leader sets the tone for the annual color palette.
- Mosaics have evolved and are growing in popularity.
- As an alternative to granite, quartz is set to be a favorite in 2015 thanks to myriad color and pattern options that mimic other natural materials, and the low-maintenance qualities of the slabs.



- Large-format tile sizes push the limits each year, allowing for more continuity in an open floor plan, allowing furnishings and décor to define the space.
- Long, lean planked tiles in various styles and finishes that mimic natural materials are popular.
- Long rectangular tiles are becoming more popular for backsplashes and shower and tub surrounds.
- What's old is new again Retro design will continue to be popular, especially in bathrooms.
- Daring colors and unique orientations of materials are setting some homes apart from the rest.
- \bullet Classic marbles in large formats and unique floor patterns are becoming more popular.

Landscaping

hile trends in landscaping don't vary to much each year, John Neff of Neff Landscaping talked with us about sprucing up our yards this spring.

According to Neff, the best time to plant grass is in the spring, before it gets too hot outside - but not too early since too much moisture, frost and freezes will kill the seeds.

Neff said it's important to apply pre-emergents between mid-March and April 15 to control crabgrass and weeds in your lawn and flower beds, saving headaches during the growing season. He also recommends six pre-emergent applications instead of five, saying, "Pesticides nowadays are different than the ones we used to have. Today's pesticides are less toxic so they disperse quicker."

When talking about color, Neff told us that the use of perennials and annuals are commonly used, but added that shrubs can add color year round. Examples include red twig and yellow twig dogwoods; and blue and yellow-color junipers.



Perennials, like tulips, daffodils and crocuses, which have to be planted in the fall, bloom first. Annuals are generally planted once the perennials die. When choosing annuals, be sure to know how much sunlight they will get before making your selections. When fertilizing flowers, Neff recommends a liquid fertilizer. He also recommends incorporating fertilizer into the soil when planting, and says that it's important to fertilize shrubbery, too.

Since deer present a problem in most areas, Neff recommends mixing things up and planting various items. Each year, lists of deer-resistant plants come out, and each year, the list gets shorter because the deer are hungry and eat more of what's available.

Lastly, don't forget to mulch, which like paint, covers up a multitude of sins. Neff recommends bark mulch, which is more inert and doesn't affect the plants in the beds. Black mulch, which looks attractive, is often made of dyed wood chips and can be unfriendly to plants.

If your yard is tired and needs an update, Neff recommends calling a landscape professional, and says your investment should last and should be able to survive our challenging winters.

Sunglasses

e've talked about home trends - now, here's a little tip about showing some style when going outdoors.

When talking with Blake Ellison at Eyetique, he shared some style tips about sunglasses this spring, saying that every collection is getting away from heavy and thickset, and that he's seeing a lot of metal - or



half metal and half plastic - in much lighter, more comfortable styles.

Additionally, manufacturers are getting away from motifs, and are not plastering their logos on the frames.

"It's nice that what is currently coming into trend is basic classic stuff," Ellison said. "We're seeing styles that used to be popular before fashion went to the over the top."

The chunky trend was very one dimensional for one style of person, and didn't look good on the vast majority. Now, with super clean, thinner, lighter weight designs, it opens up doors for more people to have more choices that really do look good.

Some vintage and throwback styles are also in, and aviators, which come in many different shapes, will always be hot.

Staying Cool

leveland summers are hot and humid, but your home can be nice and cool, unless your air conditioner breaks down. To keep your cooling system running efficiently and effectively, yearly maintenance is a must.



"Many homeowners

are unaware when their cooling systems are running poorly and how much money is being wasted in the process," said Gary Rosen of Smylie One. "It not only costs more in energy bills, but can also cause further damage to the system that could necessitate costly repairs and even replacement of your air conditioner."

As a living history performer, Jordan will portray Orson Welles for the next Beachwood Elderclass program on Thursday, April 9. Although Welles is perhaps remembered best for the movies,"Citizen Kane" and



"The Third Man," his "War of the Worlds" frightening radio broadcast remains an epic.

Anita Hirsch and Marv Sicherman A Fun-Loving Hometown Love Story

nita Hirsch has been a Beachwood resident for more than 50 years. She and her late husband, Jerry, raised their children, Laurel (Muzik - BHS class of '76), Amy (Finkenthal - BHS class of '79) and Jeff (BHS class of '85) here, in Beachwood. She is a 20-year realtor who now works for Gordon Dental Care.

Marv Sicherman, also a 50-plus-year Beachwood resident, shares a similar story. He and his late wife, Sue, who passed away in January, 2007, also raised their children, Heidi (Fleischer class of '78, whose stage name is Heidi Joyce) and Steven (class of '83) in Beachwood. As a bankruptcy attorney and adjunct law professor, he was once known as a "Kinsman Cowboy."

Nonetheless, in our small, close-knit community, although Anita and Marv's paths had crossed, they never really knew each other - until meeting on J-date and reminiscing about their pasts.

Finding themselves alone after their spouses lost their battles to cancer, both Anita and Marv signed up on J-date to find companionship - and maybe more. Marv, who signed up first, had been casually dating, but rarely met anyone with whom he wanted to go out more than once or twice. When Anita decided it was time to come out of her shell and start living again, she, too, signed up.

"When we were young, Sue told me that if she died first, she wanted me to get remarried," Mary said. "Statistically, I didn't think that would happen."

"After learning that she had cancer, I never heard her say that again," he added somberly.

"Jerry also told me that if anything happened to him, I should go out right away and go on with my life," Anita shared. "Dick Eston, Jerry's best friend, was the last person he talked to. And Dick checked on me every

day until he passed away. I think Jerry asked Dick to call me every day and take care of me, but I really don't know."

Both Anita and Mary took their deceased spouses' advice. They talked a few times and agreed to meet on a Sunday morning, just after New Year's Day, at Bob Evans for coffee. At the time, Marv asked himself why he was doing this. His kids had just returned to Los Angeles after visiting, and he thought coming out for coffee would be a waste of time.

A few minutes after Anita arrived for their coffee date, she got a call from Marv, who asked, "Are we meeting at 10 a.m. or 10 p.m.?"

"I thought this was crazy," Anita told us. "I took a deep breath and thought the meeting will be short and sweet!"

Anita already had her coffee when Mary walked in. He ordered tea, and Anita felt she would be out of there in 5-10 minutes. This was a far cry from what ended up to be an 11-hour date.

"Prior to meeting, we only had each other's first name," Marv said. "But once we met, there was a connection, and I realized who Anita was. I knew Jerry, but didn't know he'd passed away at the time. It didn't register."

"We had connections, but we weren't in each other's circles," Anita added.

The couple found themselves enjoying each other's company and decided to go for a ride down memory lane, each introducing the other to his/her old neighborhood.

"We took a ride down memory lane, driving past previous homes and schools, reminiscing," Marv said. "We were really enjoying each other's company, and ended up stopping at each of our current homes and going to

In the meantime, Anita's phone was ringing every 15 minutes. "My kids were concerned about my safety and they kept calling," she said with a chuckle. "I



thought it was amusing since they knew Marv's family and had never once checked on me during my 20-year real estate career!"

Anita then went on to tell us that while at Marv's house, they were standing at the kitchen window, talking, when suddenly a car pulled up. A woman got out of the car, retrieved some groceries, and opened the garage door.

OVI – What You May Not Know

drunk driving charge is known as Operating a Vehicle under the Influence, or OVI, under Ohio criminal law. This is a serious charge that can land you in jail and without a driver's license for a long period of time.

There are quite a few variables that determine OVI penalties, many of which are determined by the courts, the judge and whether or not you submitted to chemical tests.

An OVI in the State of Ohio states that it is against the law for any person to operate or attempt to operate a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol, drugs or any other substance which causes them to be impaired. It is a separate charge if the driver's blood alcohol concentration (BAC) level exceeds .08%.

In the event that an individual's BAC is lower than the legal limit, he/she could still be charged for an OVI if signs of impairment which raise suspicion of alcohol or drug consumption are shown. If the BAC is above 1.7, penalties worsen.

Once suspicion has been raised by a law enforcement agent, obvious questions about drinking will likely be asked and a driver may be asked to complete a series of field sobriety tests. You do not have to submit to these tests and can kindly refuse to take them.

However, by law, you will be required to complete a chemical test if arrested. Choosing to refuse this test, or tests, in the state of Ohio will result in an Administrative License Suspension (ALS). If requested by an arresting officer to take more than one test, such as breath and blood, you must submit to both. A driver may not choose which test he/she will submit to. If one is refused, the ALS will immediately be enacted. Any driver who holds an Ohio driver's license is holding an agreement of sorts which states that they will abide by the state's consent law when

they accept their license.

If a chemical test is refused, an ALS equals an automatic 12-month license suspension from the Bureau of Motor Vehicles upon conviction. For a first OVI offender, occupational privileges may be obtained after 30 days. When obliging to take the chemical tests, occupational privileges may be granted after 15 days, and the sentence may be as short as six months.

When talking with Beachwood Police Chief Keith Winebrenner, he told us that individuals are generally pulled over for some other violation, like weaving, speeding or crashing a red light. Once pulled over, if there is reason to believe that drugs or alcohol played a part in the behavior, a field sobriety test, including a horizontal gaze nystagmus test, which can't be faked, will be performed. Additional tests, some of which require divided attention, include a one-leg stand test or walking a straight line. Additionally, alphabet or finger dexterity tests may be instituted.

Chief Winebrenner explained, "In addition to seeing how someone physically performs field sobriety tests, we observe their ability to follow instructions. Is their speech slurred? Can they find their driver's license? When asked questions, are they confused?"

Chief Winebrenner went on to explain that when someone is impaired, it is hard to multi-task or divide his attention. That's why someone may be stopped for speeding - or swerving. When focusing on speed, chances are that they'll swerve. When focusing to stay in their lane, speed is often ignored.

When pulled over, there are typically two officers and everything is recorded and shown in court. The car gets towed, and in Beachwood, which uses the Shaker Heights Court, the bond is typically set at \$10,000, which means you need to come up with \$1,025 to be released. To release

yourself, officers will detain you for at least four hours or until it's safe to be released due to the impaired state. Additionally, whether you submitted to or refused a test, you will leave without a license.

Within five business days, a court date is assigned to deal with driving privileges. Until this date, there are no privileges. At this time, the judge can give limited privileges for school, work and medical if he/she chooses to.

Then, a pre-trial hearing is set. You enter your plea - guilty, not guilty or no contest. Guilty means just what it says, and you have nothing to say. Not guilty means a trial date will be set. No contest means you're accepting a finding of guilty but leaving yourself at the mercy of the judge.

There are more specifics depending on circumstances. Attorneys and prosecutors may make a deal to negotiate charges, but it is rare that a case gets thrown out.

If stopped in Beachwood for a first offense, fees are determined by the judge. The maximum penalty is \$1,075 with 30 days in jail. Twenty-seven days are often suspended, and three can sometimes be traded in for an intervention program. Additionally, six points will be tacked on your license.

In recent years, there has been a large uptake in the number of drug-related OVI's, most of which are the result of prescription drugs, in which case a blood test is required rather than a breath test. Again, if refused, an ALS will be slapped on.

In Beachwood, there were 105 OVIs in 2014. The cost of an OVI runs into the thousands. In addition to the fees mentioned above, there are costs to get your car out of the impound lot, attorney fees, court costs, license reinstatement fees and increased insurance costs.

If you've had an OVI, didn't hurt yourself or anyone else, and are reading this article, count

your blessings and take it as a warning sign. If you haven't, make smart decisions when it comes to drinking and driving. One poor decision can change

'08 BHS Graduate Leads Game Development of Words with Friends Successor

ot an idea for a gaming app? Daniel Sternfeld did, and it essentially launched his career.

In a remarkably rapid rise, the BHS Class of 2008 graduate now works as a lead engineer

at Zynga, the San Fransisco-based developer of social gaming products, including the highly successful Farmville and Words With Friends. Its latest release is Words On Tour, a word puzzle game whose development Sternfeld oversaw through a top secret, high pressure, 10-month process. The game is available through the Apple App store, Google Play and Facebook.

The 24-year-old's path began with games he played as a child, most notably Legends of Zelda, a role-playing puzzle and action adventure. He said the game that pushed him over the edge and made him want to become professionally involved with game creation was Deus Ex, an immersive role-playing experience.

"Deus Ex explored the role of storytelling in games," he explains, adding that he also learned "how simple systems could interact to create something greater than the sum of their parts." Ultimately, he drew on these factors for inspiration.

While attending the Rochester Institute of Technology, where he majored in game design and development, Sternfeld was active in events sponsored by the International Game Developers Association and the annual Global Game Jam. The latter sponsored a 48-hour event where teams created a prototype for an assigned genre. Sternfeld's strategy and sleuthing game, Fade: Case of the Stolen Diamonds, earned several awards that propelled his interest in building the game out and releasing it through the Apple App store. It earned widespread praise in the gaming industry and essentially became his ticket into the professional world.

Fade caught the attention of Zynga and merited Sternfeld with an internship at the company the year before he graduated college. His stint there involved coding and collaborating with designers on the game Café World, in which you are in charge of your own restaurant. He began working full time at Zynga following graduation.


Sternfeld's advice to those interested in the gaming field is to create their own game. "Companies want to see passionate, driven people who have a vision and can make it a reality." This is possible using many resources available on line, without necessarily needing to take a class, Sternfeld says.

If he had to offer a theory as to why gaming is so popular, Sternfeld notes that it must be the mental challenges. "People need a break from daily life, while still engaging their brain." He believes

Words on Tour delivers on this requirement.

Looking to the industry's future, Sternfeld believes games, which are evolving quickly, will become increasingly pervasive in society on general purpose devices to which a growing portion of the world has access. He anticipates that education and lifestyle niches will be the focus of future apps and will incorporate more game systems, like leaderboards and achievements as vehicles for greater motivation.

Some of the enjoyment he derives from his work stems from the way it's "a fusion of art and technology," two areas of great interest to him. He also gets a big thrill out of watching people play the games he helps create.





HAZARDOUS HOUSEHOLD WASTE ROUND-UP

Household Hazardous Waste Round-Up will be Monday, May 4 – Saturday, May 9 from 7:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m. at the Beachwood Service Department, 23355 Mercantile Road. Residents are invited to dispose of unwanted oil-based paint, pesticides and other household hazardous wastes.

The Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District can only accept materials originating from a household, not a commercial source.

MATERIALS ACCEPTED

- Oil or solvent-based paint, sealers, primers, or coatings (aerosols or liquids)
- Varnishes, polyurethanes, shellacs
- Paint thinner, mineral spirits, turpentine
- Pesticides, herbicides, fungicides
- Caustic household cleaners
- Automotive fluids, motor oil, car batteries
- Adhesives, roof tar, driveway sealer
- Kerosene, gasoline, lighter fluid
- Mercury, fluorescent bulbs

MATERIALS NOT ACCEPTED

- Latex paint
- Explosives, gun powder, ammunition, flares
- Medical waste, pharmaceuticals, sharps
- Radioactive waste (i.e. smoke detectors)

DISPOSAL OF LATEX PAINT:

Latex paint is not accepted. To dispose of latex paint, solidify and place in your curbside trash.

To solidify, remove the lid and allow liquid to evaporate. For larger amounts, mix in an equal amount of an absorbent material such as cat litter or sawdust and allow to dry. Pour thin layers of paint into a cardboard box lined with plastic, allowing the paint to dry one layer at a time.

HOME SAFETY AND EMERGENCY PLANNING

Springtime is an opportunity to make sure your home is safe and you are prepared for emergencies. Take the time to complete the following tasks to ensure you are ready:

- If your home is equipped with an alarm, make sure the alarm is in proper working order. Contact
 your alarm company and update your key holder information with current cell phone and work phone
 numbers. Post the alarm company sign near the front of the home as a deterrent to would be criminals.
- Take a look at your home from the street. Are the address numbers clearly visible both day and night? Make sure the numbers are well lit and not obstructed by trees or shrubs.
- Have a family emergency plan. Practice safe exits in the event of a fire or natural disaster. Arrange for meeting places in the neighborhood to meet if evacuation is required.
- Have an emergency radio and flashlight with batteries at hand.
- Practice makes perfect and in the event of an emergency, practice will ensure a quick and calm exit to safety.

DEER MANAGEMENT

The City of Beachwood and the Ohio Department of Natural Resources Division of Wildlife have been working together to address issues pertaining to the deer population. Note:

- Deer look for easy sources of food. To protect your garden, install a 3–4 foot barrier (vinyl, hardware cloth, etc.) with the first foot of the barrier underground to keep the small critters out like raccoons, skunks, and groundhogs. On the corners of the garden install posts that reach 7 feet off the ground. You can then run a single wire at 7 feet. Periodically hang ribbon (or aluminum pie pans to scare off the birds) to act as a visual to the deer. Deer have bad depth perception and they will not jump between the hard fence and the top wire.
- Various sprays deter deer from eating plants. Cayenne pepper can also be used by spraying plants with some water and then generously dusting them with the pepper. The hotter you make the plant the less likely the deer will eat it.
- Choose plants that tend to be less palatable. Note: if a deer is hungry enough, there is no plant that it "will never eat."

If you are concerned about deer damage on your property call the Division



of Wildlife at 330.644.2293. Often times they can identify the reason over the phone as to why the technique is not working and can give site-specific advice to help alleviate the deer problems. For more information visit www.wildohio.com.



Early Detection of Lung Cancer Saves Lives

f you watch old TV shows, you know that 50 years ago, smoking was more the norm than the exception. Many of our favorite actors sat in their make-believe living rooms puffing away on cigarettes and the airways were filled with commercials telling us which brand was the most flavorful. Smoking was acceptable and perhaps even expected in mainstream society. Now we know better.

Lung cancer is the number one cause of cancer deaths in the U.S. and cigarette smoking is the principal risk factor for the disease. And, historically, the prognosis for those diagnosed has been poor because of late-stage diagnosis. As with many cancers, early detection is the key to increased survival rates but until recently, there was no easy, cost-effective way to screen for lung cancer. University Hospitals now offers just such a screening - the low-dose lung cancer CT screening.

The test, which is painless and takes only seconds to complete, provides a threedimensional image of the lungs. Suspicious growths that show up on the scan may be

removed and biopsied or watched over time for changes. If lung cancer is found, earlier is definitely better as stage-one lung cancers have a 70 to 90 percent cure rate.

Talk to your doctor about your risk factors for the disease and whether or not you are a candidate for the screening. You may qualify if you:

- · Are a current or former smoker
- Are between the ages of 55 and 77
- · Quit less than 15 years ago
- · Smoked an average of one pack a day for 30 years or two packs a day for 15 years

This screening is not yet covered by commercial insurances* but University Hospitals offers the test for just \$99 at 11 northeast Ohio locations. Call 1-866-UH4-CARE (1-866-844-2273) to schedule a screening at a UH location near you. A written order from your physician is required.

*Medicare recently approved this screening as a covered benefit for certain high-risk patients. You are advised to check with your provider to determine your coverage.

Tips for Parents - Help Your Children Develop a "Can Do" Attitude

he child who has an "I can" attitude will do much better in school than the child who constantly says "I can't." That's where you, an adult who supports the educational process of a child or several children, can help. Here are some ways you can provide positive feedback to your children:

• Instead of asking "What did you do in school today?" be more specific. Ask"What good happened in school today?" Follow up with questions such as "How did that make you feel?" or "Why did you like it?" Or, ask your child to explain one new thing he learned that day. Often a child will need time to decompress and process the day, so right after he arrives home might not be the most productive time to learn about his day. If all you get at first is "nothing" or "boring" let it go for a while, and ask again later.

· Be a good role model. How you feel about yourself greatly influences how your children feel about themselves. Demonstrate

positive and responsible habits for your children to copy. For example, if your children see you reading for your own pleasure or enlightenment, they are much more likely to see reading as a positive activity as they move beyond the "read to me."

· Look for the good things your children do and let them know you've noticed and that you are pleased. Be specific. We automatically correct our children when they do things we don't like, but often forget to praise them when they are doing things right. To get into the habit, set a goal for yourself of three (or more) positive comments a day, and work your way up from there.

 Create opportunities for your children to succeed by breaking down big projects into easy increments and then cheer them on at the completion of each step. Keep in mind that what may seem simple to you may be overwhelming for children. If it's been neglected,

for example, an instruction to "clean your room" may be more than children can manage. Giving directions one step at a time, "put your dirty clothes into the hamper," may be all your childrenneed to succeed. Likewise, when a student brings home a big project from school, he may feel that it is overwhelming. When you help him write down the steps needed to complete the project, it helps him break it down into manageable pieces.

• Show them and tell them you love them. Don't presume your children know how much you love them. Tell them every day. Hug them, talk to them, and play with them. It's Spring! A "just us" walk through one of Beachwood's beautiful parks says "You are special" to a child.

 Watch what you say around your children even if you know they're not paying attention. Children can often hear vou even when they are paying attention to something else. Likewise, how you say something will be noticed and quietly absorbed. If you mention A child's name in a whisper to your spouse, she may well think its something bad – even if you are really planning her birthday party!

• Support them win or lose. Let your children know you support and love them even when they don't win, or when they make a big mistake. They need to know you're there to cheer them on when they try again.

• Get help if your child is struggling with school. If this year has been a struggle, call The Tutoring Center at 216.292.HELP (4357). The friendly tutors will nurture a "can do" attitude in your child, while helping him or her rapidly increase reading, writing, math or study skills in a positive, supportive environment. 

his spring, Max and Sam Babbush, along with their father, Jeff, will take a "reverse mission" trip to Honduras, where they will learn some of life's most important lessons about giving back. 


