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There are many things we choose to do in the coast zone for enjoyment. I like baking, and I have a few recipes that I make repeatedly. Almond Thumbprint Cookies (recommended by my daughter, Julie; found on simpleveganista.com) is one of my favorites. They're easy to make, tasty, and are always a hit. Here's the recipe. It's delish!

Ingredients:

2 cups almond flour
Pinch of salt
¼ cup pure maple syrup
¼ cup light flavored olive oil
2 tsp. vanilla
3 Tbsp. of your favorite jam

Instructions:

- Preheat oven to 350°F and line baking pan with parchment paper.
- Whisk together maple syrup, olive oil, and vanilla.
- Add almond flour and salt. Mix well.
- Roll into 1-inch balls and place about 2 inches apart.
- Make an indent in the center of each cookie.
- Fill indent with ½ tsp. of jam.
- Bake for 11-13 minutes. Recipe makes about 16 cookies. Store in airtight container. Enjoy!



ast month I renewed my membership to "Cultivate," Alain Picard's online pastel painting program, in which he helps students grow, thrive, create consistently, develop our potential, and share our work. Aspire

Stage 1: Apprentice

Every artist needs a guide. Apprentices are learning the foundational skills, vocabulary, and techniques necessary to create the artwork they dream of.

Stage 2: Explore

Proficiency is the gateway to exploration. Explorers are developing original works of art and discovering their creative voice through persistent practice.

Stage 3: Establish

We next refine our mission to amplify our voice. Establishing artists are developing the business of art and gaining greater authority in their niche to grow their influence.

Stage 4: Emerge

Without risk there is no reward. Emerging artists are stepping out of their comfort zone to present their work to the public, invite feedback, and cultivate their impact.



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Teamwork Makes the Dream Work

hat are the basic elements of a good life? If you ask around, most people will say good health, wealth, purposeful living, sense of belonging, supportive family, strong community, etc. While these elements make a good life, they do not necessarily mean an easy life. To truly live a good life, we must stand up to the challenges that come our way, work through them, and build a life that aligns with our values.

Challenges come to all of us – in every shape, size, and form.

I got to know of one such challenge as I sat down with Sam Babbush, Beachwood High School graduate, class of 2019, and his father, Jeff. Sam grew up in Beachwood with his mother, Melissa; Jeff; and brother, Maxwell, a BHS graduate, class of 2016. During his freshman year, Sam started to experience intense panic attacks. A passionate soccer player and athlete, it was disheartening when it started to affect his performance on and off the field.

At age 15, Sam displayed immense courage. He chose not to shy away from his problem. Instead, he decided to work through it. During this time, he transitioned from soccer to football, where he found a wonderful support system. His "I can do it" attitude and sports transition really helped, as his family rallied around him and built a huge support system to assess, diagnose, and treat his condition.

After a few years of professional therapy, counseling, and support from the school, along with family and community involvement, Sam slowly and successfully managed to improve his mental health.

After high school, Sam attended the University of Kentucky, where he continued his football career. Last year, he transferred to Charleston Southern University and quickly earned his way to be the starting kicker (his current head coach is Autry Denson, who is the all-time leading rusher for University of Notre Dame). In fact, last season Sam went 24 for 24 in extra points and even had one against

the University of Georgia, the highest ranked college football team in the country!

As Sam reflects on this achievement, he is very, very grateful. It has not been easy. His family's commitment of time, effort, and sacrifice helped him get where he is today. He also recognizes the immense support and guidance provided by BHS staff and counselors, as well as Coach Damian Creel, Coach Michael Springer, and Coach JC Commander. He is also grateful for strong community support from the Beachwood and Pepper Pike communities, and the excellent therapists who worked with him.

There were other dynamics that influenced Sam as well. Even though he comes from a Jewish family and attended Agnon in his younger years, he is the fourth generation to attend a Catholic/Christian school. His great-grandfather, Ralph August, attended University

of Notre Dame. As a result, he was exposed to different perspectives and different ways of thinking throughout his life, which helped him develop a high sense of self awareness.

A good life is lived when we stand up to the challenges that come our way, work through them, and build a life that aligns with our values.

His grandfather, Dr. Charles Babbush, attended University of Detroit; and his dad attended Gilmour Academy, stating that he needed more direction and discipline.

Sam's parents are both very proud of their son's journey, determination, and grit to overcome his obstacles and focus on paying it forward.

"The pandemic has accelerated the mental health

crisis across all age groups, so I share my story as one of hope," he said "We've pulled through the pandemic with support of family, community, relationships, and honest communication, and therefore we have strength to address the current mental health crisis as well."


Sam paints a realistic picture of his journey. "There are no shortcuts to better mental health. It takes time, consistency, and persistence to resolve underlying issues until they shrink down and/or are eliminated. I encourage kids and adults to open up about their struggles so they can get help. Hiding or pretending that everything is okay does not solve the problem. In fact, it only exacerbates the suffering."

In his time with me, Sam shared that the journey is so well worth it; to keep fighting the fight. He also notes that another basic element to leading a good life is sound mental health!

"I was speechless and overjoyed," said Mayor Berns.

The feature appears in the magazine's June issue, and its rankings are highly respected and feverishly sought by homebuyers and realtors, according to Colleen. It's noteworthy that she also mentions in her introductory magazine column that, "While the numbers are a huge help, maybe the real lesson is that the data can only take you so far – and it's the people who make the place." Mayor Berns echoes that sentiment.

"The great part about this honor is that we all share it," said Mayor Berns. "It's the cumulative result of conditions created by City Council, City Hall employees, residents, business owners, and those who patronize our commercial establishments. We all work hard to keep this small community safe, clean, and appealing."

The study surveys 77 suburbs, and in 2021, Beachwood ranked

12. The ranking is based on evaluating three major factors: safety, education, and housing. Other desirable qualities the editors consider include public services, diversity, and walkability, and all of the aforementioned categories are weighted more than others, like property taxes. Beachwood performed particularly well with its education ranking (#2), number of community services, diversity (29.7% minorities), and percentage of roads with sidewalks (90%).

Two realtors, Susie Loparo and Sharon Friedman, both of whom sell many homes in Beachwood, offered reactions to the article.

Susie, a Beachwood resident for more than 60 years and a graduate of BHS, says she believes that "Beachwood has always been the best city to live in," adding, "It's easy to sell Beachwood." She also noted that its central location is attractive with its close proximity to cultural areas, freeways, healthcare facilities, shopping, and restaurants.

"It's also very walkable, which is something everybody wants today," she added. She then mentioned that she's "been inside most of the homes in Beachwood and sold a lot of them."

Sharon likes to tout
Beachwood's city services to
clients. "I always tell people
that you can eat off the street
after a winter snowstorm
because everything has been
plowed clean." She also noted
that Beachwood has many
amenities that can appeal to all
age groups.

"Beachwood is a place where you can be born, die, and do everything in between because there are so many options," she said. "It's an all-around community and the recreation facilities are second to none.

"I sold a home in Beachwood to a couple from Michigan and when I was driving them around the community, I pointed out the Six Flags of Beachwood (the Beachwood Family Aquatic Center); it's truly unbelievable." It was also called out by *Northeast Ohio Parent Magazine*, which recently awarded BFAC with "Best Pool or Splash Pad" in its 2022 Parents Choice Awards.

The remaining cities in the Top 20 include (in order) Rocky River, Pepper Pike, Moreland Hills, Orange Village, Solon, Bay Village, Hudson, Brecksville, Chagrin Falls, Highland Heights, Westlake, Bath, Avon, Shaker Heights, Avon Lake, Mayfield Village, Mayfield Heights, Broadview Heights, and Middleburg Heights.

The methodology used by Cleveland Magazine's staff involved many hours of research to produce its annual assessment that ranks Cleveland's 77 suburbs. The Top 20 are those suburbs with the highest combined scores, reflecting best performances in all of the categories combined.

Overall rankings are determined using raw data that is converted into points calculated from the average in each category.

Scores are assigned to each suburb for every category used in the rankings, based on the year's available numbers. The scores are tabulated while weighting certain categories more heavily than others. Safety and education, for example, are given more weight than property taxes, which is given more weight than environmental infractions. The Top 20 are those suburbs with the highest combined scores; in other words, the suburbs that perform best in all of the categories combined.

Education scores are based on the state's 26 possible indicators for student performance which draw on standardized tests, a gifted indicator that measures how gifted students are performing, a chronic absenteeism improvement indicator measuring the number of students who are chronically absent (missing at least 10% of the school year) as well as the schools' efforts to reduce that number, and an end-ofcourse improvement indicator measuring the performance and improvement on retaken end-of-course tests. Each school's possible indicators vary depending on which tests its students take.



and reduction for owner-occupied residential property for levies passed before November 2013.

- Population, poverty, diversity, and owner-occupied housing: U.S. Census Bureau, 2015-2019 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates. Diversity points are awarded based on the suburb's percentage of minority residents (nonwhite, Hispanic or multiracial), with the most points given to those suburbs closest to a 50% balance.
- Environmental infractions: The Ohio Environmental Protection Agency's database of reported polluted sites, which is continuously updated and includes reports of polluted sites that the EPA has not fully investigated.
- Community services: The mayor's office
 of each suburb provides information
 related to which of the following services
 are available to all residents: tennis
 courts, basketball courts, baseball and
 softball diamonds, indoor or outdoor ice
 rinks, indoor swimming pools, outdoor
 swimming pools, public playgrounds,
 recreation centers, public skateboarding
 parks, senior services, youth services, free
 mulch, free leaf pickup, free garbage pick up and recycling programs.
- Roads with sidewalks: Each suburb provided information on the miles of roads and sidewalks. Fire Chief Steven Holtzman

started his career with The City of Beachwood in October of 1992. He came to the city with a Bachelor of Science and Technology from Bowling Green State University, and was appointed to the Heights Area Special Rescue team in 1997, serving for more than 21 years.

In 1999, Steve was appointed as an original member of the Fire Department's Honor Guard and served in that capacity for 20 years. He was promoted to lieutenant in November 2000 and to captain in August 2002.

Steve served several years as the department's EMS coordinator and infection control officer, during which time he obtained his state certification as a fire instructor. He was then appointed as lead training instructor, followed by the position as fire chief in June 2019.

During the pandemic, Steve served as the city's chief medical officer and infection control officer, and provided guidance on COVID-19 policies. A plan was formulated and continuously updated, based on CDC guidelines. Early on, Steve worked with the department's EMS coordinator to obtain PPE supplies that safely carried all departments through the pandemic.



Therese Ferritto was hired as Fire Prevention secretary in 2008, and was responsible for coordinating schedules and documents.

In 2018, she became the department's administrative assistant, and in 2019, she assisted with an administration transition. Therese interacts with all aspects of the Fire Department. She is the department's ambassador with the public, and does a great

job fielding calls and making people feel welcome. She also coordinates all department purchases and makes sure everyone has what they need for day-to-day operations.

In 2020 when the world was hit by the pandemic and most people worked from home, members of the Fire Department came to work every day and Therese didn't miss a beat. She worked closely

with our EMS coordinator to procure PPE supplies and fielded hundreds of calls when the city hosted its drivethrough vaccination clinics. She also worked at the clinics.

Therese is the glue that helps the department's operations stick together. She is respected by all department members and was selected by all the officers to be named a Hometown Hero.



Greg Liggett, a veteran firefighter and paramedic with exemplary performance, is respected all. He is always engaged in department activities and lends his expertise to any project directed his way.

He was hired by the City of Beachwood in July 2000 and was appointed to the Heights Area Special Rescue Team in 2003, where he's served for 18 years.

In 2012, he was assigned as a

member of the design team and traveled the country to compile best-practice ideas to incorporate into a new fire station that would lead us into the future. Greg worked on the project through the new fire department's completion.

In 2014, Greg was appointed as a member of the Fire Department's Honor Guard, which promotes the department in a professional manner and represents it during unfortunate times of death for department members or past members.

In 2019, he was appointed to the preplan committee that works to revamp and improve fire preplans for all commercial buildings. Firefighters depend on this information because it helps them understand the complexities of each building, the systems that are operating within each building, and how they affect their ability to mitigate emergencies.

They are also role models who display courage, care, and concern – they do ordinary things in extraordinary ways.

Riley traveled with Beachwood's varsity football team and attended every game, and worked with the


girls' varsity basketball team for two years. She was also a member of the girls' varsity softball team, and was one of two freshmen to make the team her first year.

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BAKED by Abbie

Blueberry Buckle

et's return to summer fruit desserts and discuss "buckles." Essentially, these treats are fruit-filled coffee cakes. The name derives from the baking process. While the cake bakes, the batter rises around the fruit creating a craggy top surface.

Buckles are delicious any way you make them: with one kind of berry, with mixed berries, with stone fruit, or even a combination of berries and stone fruit. The blueberry-peach combo is quite popular.

This recipe may be created with either fresh or frozen berries. But, since it's summer, don't miss out on the joy of baking with fresh, plump berries. It's the greatest part of summer. And the best aspect about this cake is that you can enjoy it for breakfast, brunch, or dessert!

Top off your warm, baked buckles

with a generous dollop of vanilla yogurt, ice cream, or whipped cream. A dusting of powdered sugar is likewise nice.



Recipe adapted from the 2021 Revised and Updated King Arthur Baking Company's All-Purpose Baker's Companion

Ingredients Batter

- ½ cup white sugar
- 4 tablespoons butter (½ stick), softened
- 1 large egg
- 2-3 teaspoons lemon zest
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 cups plus 1 tablespoon allpurpose flour, divided use
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ cup milk/buttermilk
- 2 2 ½ cups blueberries (if frozen, unthawed)

Streusel

- ¼ cup each white and light brown sugar
- ¾ cup all-purpose flour
- ½ teaspoon cinnamon (optional)
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 4-5 tablespoons butter, softened

Directions

- Grease and flour a 9" square or round pan and preheat oven to 375°F.
- Batter In a stand mixer, cream sugar and butter. Add zest, vanilla and egg, and mix at medium speed for 1 minute. Whisk together dry ingredients. Add milk alternately with the dry ingredients, scraping sides of bowl as necessary. With a spatula, gently fold in berries

that have been tossed with the 1 tablespoon flour (which prevents them from sinking). Carefully spread batter into prepared pan.

- Topping In a medium bowl, whisk together sugars, flour, cinnamon and salt. Add butter. Use two forks or a pastry blender to mix into crumbs to sprinkle over batter.
- Bake for 45-50 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean.
 Remove from oven. Cool 10 minutes before serving.

Don't Just Do Something – Do The Right Thing

ollowing the August 4, 2019, mass shooting in Dayton, the community came together to mourn its losses and comfort one another. Governor Mike DeWine joined them. It was not the Governor's words that were memorable, but what the crowd shouted at him. They chanted, "Do Something!"

Governor DeWine heard the crowd and he certainly did something. He did three thing: three of the wrong things.

On January 4, 2021, Governor DeWine signed Senate Bill 175 (Shoot First/Kill at Will law), which expanded Ohio's self-defense laws. SB 175 makes it legal for people to start a fight, escalate the fight, and kill the other person if you feel afraid. SB 175 seeks to justify gun violence, not reduce it. It is fear-based nonsense driven by the gun lobby.

On March 14, 2022, the Governor signed Senate Bill 215,

which allowed Ohioans to carry a loaded, concealed handgun in public without any permit. This legislation also repealed the duty to notify law enforcement if you are in possession of a firearm, putting all safety forces at risk.

And on June 13, 2022, the same day SB 215 took effect, Governor DeWine signed into law House Bill 99, the controversial legislation to allow teachers and staff to be armed in schools. Police, teachers' unions, civil rights groups, and students all strongly opposed this legislation.

What Could We Do? I believe the first best step to reducing gun violence is to enact background check legislation that closes all security loopholes surrounding firearm sales. For example, if someone is on a "no-fly" list because he is judged too dangerous to be on an airplane, then perhaps he shouldn't be able to buy a weapon of war.

I and my Ohio House Democratic colleagues are trying to do the right thing by enacting common sense gun safety laws. Red flag laws, assault weapon bans, and fixing the background check loopholes will help end gun violence, and will make our communities, schools, supermarkets, movie theaters and places of worship safer. We all want to live in a state where citizens and law enforcement both get home safely at the end of the day. Ohio deserves better.

Each of us has the power to be a part of what heals, unites, and moves us forward differently.



LEAF PARTY DAY, UNIQUE CELEBRATION FALLS ON JULY 8

Leaf Party Day came to fruition due to the passion of 20-yearold Bartu Hatipoglu, a Beachwood resident who doesn't let autism get in the way of his unique ability to connect with others through nature.

Bartu understands nature and has developed a special relationship with trees and the environment in general. He can



often be spotted in the neighborhood planting bulbs, nursing plants back to life and hauling fallen tree limbs back to the created when Bartu began

collecting leaves from the streets of Bryden Road in Beachwood. He quickly got wise to the Public Works Department's pickup times and began collecting from neighbors before the leaves were picked up while his mother rode in her car alongside him. Even snow never thwarted his determination.

In 2017, Bartu began sharing his love for leaves with Pool Manager Missy Bystrom and other employees at the Beachwood Family Aquatic Center. His pure spirit and unconditional joy were contagious.

"Little by little, Bartu began bringing leaves to the pool in 2017," Missy explained. "Fast forward, leaves turned into small branches and he began sharing them with pool patrons. Children began following him around the lazy river chanting 'Leaf Party' as they swung their branches with leaves above their heads. It got bigger the following year in 2018 when Community Services Director Karen Carmen, who's now retired, took some delight in his interest in leaves and supported his enthusiasm."

Bartu is a rule follower, but Karen knew telling him not to bring leaves wasn't an option. She purchased stalks of artificial leaves and created an official Leaf Party bucket at the pool entrance. From that point on, Bartu jokingly titled the former Community Services Director as the 'Inspector.'

Year after year, Beachwood's Leaf Party Day has only grown. Bartu is a local legend with the summer campers who rush over to see him while lifeguards chant 'Leaf Party' with the patrons. Community Services Director Derek Schroeder has helped the event expand with leaf-themed crafts, garlands, crowns, t-shirts and more.

Although it isn't officially documented in Beachwood history, employees are fairly certain that Bartu is the first resident to do a flip off the high dive while holding leaves. The 5th annual Leaf Party is scheduled for Friday, July 8, 1-3 p.m. at the Beachwood Family Aquatic Center for members only. For more information, visit BeachwoodRec.com.

rtists have had a complex relationship with time and place since the earliest known cave paintings. Then, as now, artists engage memories of the past while being focused in the moment to create images that would record their existence for the future.

This exhibition, organized by Susan Gordon Merdler, Beachwood Community Services senior adult manager, and Beachwood resident Mark Soppeland, features four artists who explore diverse artistic practices that involve highly personal approaches to the interconnected, broadly defined ideas of time, travel, and the garden.

Dustin Grella is an assistant professor of animation at Queen's College in New York. His stop action animated projects have been exhibited at many international venues, including showings at the Cannes Film Festival and The Museum of Modern Art in New York. His ongoing project is the Animation Hotline in which

he has left an open invitation to the world to leave recorded messages on his phone machine of personal short stories. These become the soundtracks to his remarkable visual interpretations.

Liz Maugans is the founding director of Zygote Press, current director of YARDS Projects, and

curator of the Dalad Collection at Worthington Yards in Cleveland's Warehouse District. Her multilayered paintings and collagebased prints are created, in part, from images reconsidered and repurposed from her past to make contemporary commentary on politics, social issues, and her personal life as an artist, wife, and mother.

Christopher Hoot is

a professor of art at the University of Akron's Myers School of Art, where he teaches foundations and graphic design courses. His current research moves between the old-world techniques of paper marbling, other forms of painting, and digital photography, which merge with

which merge with high-tech computer generated and manipulated images and video art. These media and techniques are


combined and intertwined to investigate and form abstract landscapes, soundscapes, and cityscapes that resonate on various levels.

National Merit Scholarship: Over 1.6 million juniors in more than 22,000 high schools entered the National Merit competition by taking the PSAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. Approximately 16,000 semi-finalists were named on a state-representational basis. Semi-finalists were the highest-scoring program entrants in each state and represented less than 1% of the nation's seniors. To compete for Merit Scholarship awards, each Semi-finalist first had to submit a detailed application, essay, endorsements and more. From that group, 15,000 are named Finalists and, of the Finalists, approximately half achieve Merit Scholar status.





have always loved hanging out on the front porch. This probably dates back to when I was a little kid. From my pre-school perspective, our house, across the street from a city park, had an enormous front porch. Big enough to build tents, sleep outside on a hot summer night, and entertain a child's imagination. I loved dangling my feet from the porch swing and watching the world go by. There was no air-conditioning back then, so my family spent many a hot, humid evening on the porch, hoping for a hint of a breeze.

At my home in Beachwood, I'm one of the few on Campus Road who can still enjoy the solitude and social life unique to the front porch. Any lazy summer morning, I'm out there with a mug of hot coffee, lounging on the wicker couch. In the evening, it's a glass of chilled Sauvignon Blanc.

For a change of scenery, my husband brings his word search puzzle book outdoors while I curl up with a good mystery. We encourage our grandchildren to appreciate rainstorms rolling in. There's something exhilarating about smelling the rain just before it arrives, hearing the thunder, watching the downpour, and sometimes

feeling the gentle spray of a summer shower.

Our neighbors know that they have an open invitation to stop and visit. We talk to everyone and find out what's happening on our street. It's fun to see kids playing outdoors and growing up before our eyes. There is camaraderie, friendship, and a sense of belonging to the community.

On my daily walk up and down Beachwood's side streets, I notice a revitalization of the front porch. While some sit unused, there's evidence of more and more residents enjoying the comforts of the space just outside their front door. When summer begins, Marlene

immediately decorates her front porch on Duffield Road with hanging and potted plants. No longer obsolete due to the addition of air conditioning, the front porch is finding new life, thanks in part to the age of social distancing.

Penny's front porch on Brentwood Road became her oasis during the pandemic. She made the most of it with a few chairs and a little table. It's big enough to have a few friends over for a socially distanced, outdoor visit. Penny loves it when people stop by to sit and schmooze. "Even though I have a back porch, I love being out front," she said. "I can watch people walking up and down the street. They wave, I wave, and I feel connected to my neighborhood."

On my daily walk up and down Beachwood's side streets, I notice a revitalization of the front porch.

"We weren't looking for a porch, but it is definitely a bonus," says Mollie of her home on Wimbledon. Her husband, Ricky, adds, "When we first moved in, it was buried behind overgrown bushes and ground cover. Once we unearthed it, the porch became a welcoming

space to be outside." The best part is that it becomes an extension of their house. Ricky, who grew up having a front porch, appreciates "getting away from our four walls without leaving home." Besides watching lightning storms, they can oversee the kids as they play or "heckle" the neighbors as they walk their dogs. "It's easy to say, 'Hi, how 'ya doing?""

Mollie and Ricky's brick patio, also in the front, is mainly for relaxing with neighbors and friends, often enjoying cocktails around the fire pit. "But," Mollie says, "the front porch is for quiet time and watching the neighborhood. It's a good seat for all the action!" And seeing fireflies light up the yard at night never gets old.

A recent Wall Street Journal article reports that about 65% of new American homes are built with a front porch, up from 42% twenty-five ago. Builders are fielding requests, possibly due to emotional ties to a simpler time. Reminiscent of the early 1800s, with the pastime of sitting out on the stoop, families naturally gravitate to the front yard.

Professional Porch Sitters Union Local 1339, a tonguein-cheek group, was created in Kentucky in 1999. Its founder, Claude Stephens, describes the porch as "a magical place where you are transported to a better state of mind, and memories are born. It's the only place where you can feel like you are outside and inside at the same time; out with all of the neighbors and alone reading a book."

Porch sitting is a lost art that can be revived even without a physical structure. Jan transformed the concrete entrance to her home on Hurlingham Road into a front porch. With chairs, a table, some decorations, and flowers, she created a cozy retreat where she loves to relax.

By setting up Adirondack or lawn chairs and a little table in the driveway or on the grass, homeowners can "set a spell" as folks did "back in the day."

Take indoor activities outdoors. When kids want a snack, send them outdoors to eat it. Catch up on long-overdue phone calls with friends. Do a crossword puzzle. Have a cold drink. Start an after-dinner ritual of taking time to relax outdoors. Or just do nothing but enjoy the fresh air. When temperatures cool down in the fall, a few blankets and a space heater extend the pleasure of porchsitting season.



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

Jewish Population Study

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The Jewish Federation of Cleveland and Jewish Community Board of Akron, in coordination with the research team of NORC at the University of Chicago and the Cohen Center for Modern Jewish Studies at Brandeis University, will launch a study of the area's Jewish population this month. This study's findings will be used to inform the long-term planning for the Jewish communities throughout the region over the next decade and beyond - from addressing mental health issues to confronting antisemitism, and much more.

"Every 10 years or so, the Federation conducts an independent examination of the local Jewish community to gain additional insight into the underlying factors that are effecting how people live Jewishly today and influence
