

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

CITY COUNCIL MIKE BURKONS

I love Beachwood. Always have. It's why my wife and I moved here with our family in 2012. More important than loving Beachwood, I believe in the future of Beachwood.

I have been paying attention to city finances as long as I have lived here. While I know I am an outlier in this regard, I think everyone should. When I first started speaking out on what I believed was fiscal irresponsibility, I stood alone. I was asked again and again, "How dare you question?" And then my statements about the new fire station became reality as the project ballooned to \$14 million, double what City Council wanted to spend. There were still some who called me crazy.

After years of pointing out similar issues, I ran for City Council in 2017. Although unsuccessful, I was reassured I wasn't standing alone – at least 1,000 of you stood with me. I continued to press on with you by my side, despite pushback from the insiders. In 2019, I had enough support to receive the second most votes and I was honored **to be** elected as your City Council member.

l've lived up to my promise to be independent, speaking for the silent majority, and regardless of your political affiliation or if you put my sign in your yard, fighting for your best interests and those of the city. My first two years saw me on the losing side of a few 6-1 votes relating to the overspending of the city on projects. Let me be clear, I'm not against projects or spending. I'm against overspending on projects. We all should be. And this council/administration has been overspending on projects for years.

Not all is lost. I have found myself on the losing side of 4-3 votes recently. We are not alone. We are getting closer, but aren't yet where we need to be.

This is why I am again asking for your vote. I also ask that you vote for Howard Darvin, Karen Tindel, and Matt Hildebrand. Separately, we each bring something unique and important. Together, we will ensure responsible development and spending that will allow our city's continued success for generations to come.

CITY COUNCIL HOWARD DARVIN

I started my surgical practice in Beachwood in 1991 and recently fully retired. Subsequently, our family moved into the community, lured by the location, excellent schools, city services and amenities: the socalled Beachwood magnetic pull of schools, pools, and shuls. We were very happy to celebrate our 25th anniversary as residents of our wonderful city this summer.

Several months ago, City Council voted to reduce a portion of our real estate taxes to temper the financial impact of the tax increase caused by the recently approved school bond levy. This tax cut is set to expire in three years unless City Council renews it. I am one of four like-minded candidates, along with **Karen Tindel**, **Matthew Hildebrand**, and **Mike Burkons**, who propose a permanent tax cut.

I embrace sensible spending and competitive bidding. I will provide Beachwood residents with amenities we all desire, purchased intelligently. For example, let's examine my concerns about the playground project adjacent to the **Beachwood Family Aquatic** Center. It was conceived without providing a budget or direction to the design firms other than "wow us." My life as a vascular surgeon, managing partner, assistant clinical professor, division and departmental chairperson, board member of both nonprofit and for-profit institutions, entrepreneur, spouse, father, and recently grandfather has taught me much: How to communicate, collaborate, delegate, negotiate, take responsibility, budget, prioritize, lead, plan, empathize, and love.

Beachwood's success as a city is the result of the planning, foresight, collaboration, and execution of the vision of a group of city leaders dating back over five decades. Working together with residents, issues of rezoning, deed



restrictions, land acquisition, and infrastructure improvement were settled, giving us the incomparable community we now enjoy.

CITY COUNCIL MATT HILDEBRAND



I'm Matt Hildebrand, and I'm running for Beachwood City Council. Our family moved to Beachwood for the amazing city amenities and the thriving modern Orthodox Jewish community.

Since January 2022, I've attended virtually every City Council meeting and many committee meetings. This has provided a bird's-eye view of what is working in city government, what is not working, and what needs to be urgently addressed to make Beachwood even better for everyone.

Our city's engineering design contracts are a pressing issue. The only person in the city who has the background to determine if the contract is appropriate is the same person who has a financial interest in the most expensive design. If I'm elected, the first order of business must be a revision to how the city awards these engineering contracts. University Heights and Shaker Heights have implemented a strategy that can be adopted by Beachwood. Engineering design contracts up to \$25,000 (the mayor's spending limit) can be authorized by the administration. Engineering design contracts from \$25,001\$50,000 must be approved by City Council. Engineering design contracts over \$50,000 would require a formal competitive process. Competition is important as it allows for different designs to be considered while encouraging sensible spending. This is the right thing to do.

I hope that one of the positive things to come from my campaign is a realization that the city's priorities are out of alignment with their residents. By listening to our community, residents would have preferred basketball courts before an underutilized outdoor fitness court while **prioritizing safety concerns such as appropriately lit side streets before committing to a \$3.5 million playground project**. I'm one of four likeminded candidates whose platform emphasizes sensible spending and addresses real city issues.

Beachwood does a lot of things really well, but we can't pretend that all is perfect. I'm asking for your vote, as well as votes for Mike Burkons, Howard Darvin, and Karen Tindel. I am Karen Tindel, a proud Beachwood resident of 25 years. Our family chose Beachwood for the outstanding schools, abundant diversity, low taxes, and best-in-class city services. Having experienced the incredible benefits of living in Beachwood, I am also aware of instances when residents' **voices go unheard**.

With an MBA and over 30 years of financial leadership in healthcare and nonprofits, I will lend my expertise and collaborate with others ensuring **sensible spending** on projects and develop comprehensive budgets and updated master plans. We may be able to reduce costs by using competitive bidding practices and provide opportunities for minorities and women-owned businesses to earn contracts with our city.

Residents are asking for increased safety and security, sidewalks, and energy efficient lighting. It is not the priority of the current City Council who are busy allocating resources on a \$3.5-million playground and moving around the community garden boxes! **Voices going unheard**!

I have been vocal in my opposition to the Chagrin Boulevard I-271 Corridor Project, which would adversely impact over 200 families and potentially cost the city millions of dollars. The project's intention is to mitigate a traffic problem that is nonexistent other than during peak rush hour. This project was considered in 2017 and 2019 and did not move forward because of overwhelming resident feedback. It was resurrected in 2022 and City Council passed it 6-1, despite strong opposition. The project has a potential budget of \$20 million. **Voices** going unheard!

Without a master plan guiding the city how best to use our limited space, we cannot execute projects within reasonable budgets. The pickleball courts project is an example of a highly desirable project with initial cost



estimates around \$500,000. Council expanded the project by a vote of 6-1 increasing the projected cost to \$1.7 million without significant value added, delaying the opening almost a full season.

In the past year, our city has approved a tremendous amount on engineering fees, legal fees, and embarrassing lawsuit settlements. For this to end, we must elect council members who are independent, critical thinkers such as Howard Darvin, Matt Hildebrand, Mike Burkons, and myself. If elected, we will be **your voice** and work tirelessly towards responsible governance, for the betterment of our city.



Papa's Path Raises Awareness for Parkinson's

ore than half a century ago, maxillofacial surgeon Charles "Chuck" A. Babbush, DDS, MScD, helped popularize the use of dental implants and successfully completed cases that were thought to be beyond repair. His goal was to remind his patients of their worth and build their confidence to smile again.

Upon noticing a minor tremor in his right arm, Chuck was initially diagnosed with essential tremors. This news did not diminish his drive or his need to continue to help others.

As his symptoms worsened, he made the difficult decision to retire from the work he loved so much. Over time, his tremors dissipated, but the dyskinesia (involuntary muscle movements) increased with what was then diagnosed as Parkinson's disease. When his care team suggested an evaluation for deep brain stimulation (DBS) surgery, he became hopeful, only to be denied the opportunity. Chuck then pursued a second opinion at University Hospitals, where he received approval to proceed with the surgery.

In Chuck's kind, optimistic fashion, he chose to document his recovery journey and share it with others to provide hope for those who had been diagnosed with Parkinson's.

"The feelings of being healthier and able to fend for myself were key aspects of this whole disease process and treatment," Chuck said. "UH really went out on a limb to do something for people with Parkinson's."

Inspired by his much improved postoperation condition, Chuck and his wife, Sandy, established the Babbush Family Fund for Parkinson's Education, Research, and Innovation at University Hospitals.

"In addition to standard and revolutionary treatments, there are simple ways to help," Chuck explained. "Quotidian tasks like tying shoelaces can be daunting, so I've been on the lookout for products to amplify extremity strength and fine-tune motor skills. With the support of our family fund, I'd like to create a 'Parkinson's starter kit' that patients will receive upon diagnosis. Each kit will contain tools that will maintain skills and improve quality of life."

Chuck and his family are working with Camilla Kilbane, M.D., director of the Parkinson's and Movement Disorder Center at UH, to survey the Parkinson's patient population about what tools they need to aid in living well. With support from UH Ventures, the hospital system's healthcare innovation and commercialization platform, the team hopes to refine and commercialize the items included in the kit, offer it to Parkinson's patients, and market it for widespread adoption. The Babbush Family Fund will also launch promising clinical research projects and support training and education opportunities for neurology residents, fellows, and faculty.

Chuck emphasized that while UH provided quality care, he credits his family with getting him through the most difficult parts of his journey.

"All of my children and their families are beautiful – inside and out," he said. "And then there is Sandy, my most important caregiver who helps me around the clock and shares my passion for finding ways to better treat Parkinson's disease."

In addition to the fund, the Babbush family children have developed www.papaspath.org to raise awareness by telling their father's story. Papa's Path documents Chuck's journey and his creative processes, and provides information and opportunities for people to support the Babbush fund. Chuck, who formerly enjoyed painting as a respite from the demands of his surgical practice, returned to his art as a therapeutic outlet when he was no longer physically able to work. These colorful paintings inspired the design for Papa's Path logo, created by Hannah Frayman, Beachwood High School, class of 2015.

Along with the new website, designed and developed by Sheila Goldman Margolis, BHS, class of 1988, the family has already planned their first event, a 24- hour walk (the brainchild of Jeff Babbush, Chuck's oldest son). Having lived through the dramatic progression of Chuck's Parkinson's symptoms and the non-stop movement of his dyskinesia, his children wanted to replicate the constant motion by walking for 24 hours. "We welcome family and friends to join us for one hour, for all 24 hours or anything in between. And make sure you meet us at Ahuja Medical Center for our celebration event on Sunday morning when Papa ceremoniously crosses the finish line," said David Babbush, Chuck's youngest son.


"We organized this walk to raise awareness and funds, and to honor our hero, our determined to never-give-up role model, our dad," said Chuck's daughter, Amy Babbush Eisenberg. "This event is all about coming together as a community to support a cause



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BAKED by Abbie Chocolate Cranberry Blondies

bet you are like me and assumed that brownies were created before blondies and also had no idea that blondies are as American as apple pie! Both are true.

According to Seconds Food History (secondshistory.com), the first known recipe for brownies was published in 1896 by Fannie Farmer, a pioneer of modern American cookery. Her recipe, however, did not include chocolate, but it did include molasses, vanilla, and brown sugar (and hence the hint of caramel or butterscotch flavor). Fannie added chocolate to her recipe in 1906, coinciding with the rapid expansion of chocolate manufacturing in America.

Chocolate brownies became the norm and came to be known as brownies, getting their name from mischievous little goblin-like creatures known as "Brownies," which were featured in cartoons and books of Canadian author Palmer Cox. During the 1950s, the original molasses brownies came to be known as blonde brownies, which in turn became just "blondies."

These Chocolate and Cranberry Blondies, a SallysBakingAddiction.com recipe inspired by one in the 2021 foundational baking skills book *Baker Bettie's Better Baking Book* by Kristin Hoffman, are a nice twist on the original cookie bars. Furthermore, with dried cranberries, they are perfect for fall.



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Ingredients

- ¾ cup light or dark brown sugar, lightly packed
- ¼ cup granulated sugar
- ¹/₂ cup unsalted butter, melted and slightly cooled
- 1 large egg + 1 egg yolk, at room temperature
- 2 t vanilla extract
- 1 t orange zest
- 1/2 t baking powder
- ½ t salt
- 1 ¹/₃ cups all-purpose flour
- ¾ cup dark or white chocolate chips/chunks
- ¾ cup dried cranberries

Directions

- Pre-heat oven to 350°F. Line an 8-inch square pan or a 9-inch round pan with parchment paper or grease with non-stick spray.
- In a large mixing bowl, whisk together the brown and granulated sugars with the melted butter. Add the egg, egg yolk, vanilla, and orange zest and whisk until well. incorporated, about 30 seconds.
- Add the baking powder, salt, and flour to the mixing bowl and use a silicone spatula



or spoon to stir together until well combined. Stir for about 30 seconds. Fold in the chocolate and cranberries.

- Transfer mixture into the prepared pan and spread evenly.
- Bake for about 30 minutes or until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean.
- Cool for at least 15 minutes before slicing into squares/ wedges.

The Reproductive Rights Constitutional Amendment: Privacy or Punishment? By State Senator Kent Smith

s compared to the recent August election's single issue, Ohioans will have a new and different Issue 1 that will demand their attention this November.

If adopted, Issue 1 would allow Ohioans to enshrine reproductive rights into the Ohio Constitution. A Yes vote would keep government out of your family's personal medical decisions.

In my view, Ohioans should have the freedom to make personal, private decisions for their families without Ohio politicians inserting themselves in the process. This opinion seems to be the majority viewpoint in the state. A survey conducted earlier in the summer found that 59% of Ohioans wanted to make reproductive health care decisions themselves.

The proposed Right to Reproductive Freedom amendment to the Ohio Constitution on the November ballot offers two options for Ohio voters: privacy or punishment. Ohio women will either be trusted to make the decision that is best for them or Columbus politicians will make those decisions for all pregnant people regardless of the circumstance.

In short, reproductive freedom means every woman can choose what is right for her health, circumstance, or what is in the best interests of her family. It means that no woman will be punished because of a pregnancy.

If Issue 1 does not pass, then government will be charged

with investigating Ohio families medical conditions and subsequent decisions. Police may be forced to determine if miscarriages were murders, who was the responsible party, what criminal charges may result, and what subsequent punishments may be legally required.

Issue 1 does not impact parental rights, nor does it mandate gender affirming care for minors. It is about family privacy, individual medical care, and reproductive freedom. If you want to make those decisions yourself – versus the 132 members of the Ohio Legislature making them for you – you should vote Yes on Issue 1 this November. If adopted, Issue 1 would allow Ohioans to enshrine reproductive rights into the Ohio Constitution. A Yes vote would keep government out of your family's personal medical decisions.

Recent Zoning Code Amendments Ordinance 2023-11

During the September 5 council meeting, we approved some significant changes to our planning and zoning code, changes that reflect our commitment to progress, equality and the safety of our community. These changes have been meticulously crafted to serve the best interests of our residents.

Three core principles guided our efforts:

- First, we had to ensure that our zoning code aligns with state and federal regulations. It was essential that we avoid the legal disputes that have plagued neighboring cities, saving our resources and upholding the rule of law. These updates bring us in line with these regulations and better support our community's evolving needs.
- Second, we're bolstering safeguards to protect our cherished single-family residential neighborhoods, known as U-1 districts. We recognize the value of these neighborhoods to our residents – these are places where families invest their dreams, their security and their futures. Our code maintains the integrity of these areas while allowing for necessary growth and change.
- The third principle involves fostering inclusivity by accommodating smaller institutional uses, such as places of worship, private schools and charter schools in U-5 districts.

Our city thrives on diversity, and this step reflects

Any application for a zoning code change will quickly kick off a detailed process that will result in a top-to-bottom, case-by-case review. Every proposed change for a particular use will take into consideration the impact on that neighborhood and the city. Our evaluation will be a fair and comprehensive process, conducted in public, that reflects the values and priorities of our community.

These zoning code updates represent a milestone for Beachwood. They're not only about policy; they're about the heart of our city, our neighborhoods and the individuals who call this place home. I want to

express my gratitude to our City Planner, City Council and our legal team. Their dedication has shaped these changes, ensuring a more equitable, safe and vibrant future for our city.

Beachwood FOPA: Rebuilding Membership to Support the Beachwood PD

he Fraternal Order of Police (FOP) is the world's largest organization of sworn law enforcement officers, with more than 364,000 members in more than 2,200 lodges. It is the voice of those who dedicate their lives to protecting and serving our communities.

Additionally, the FOP promotes improved law enforcement methods and the teaching of respect for law and order, and is committed to representing its members through education, leadership, governmental involvement, and employee representation.

The Fraternal Order of Police Associates (FOPA) is an associate lodge that works with the FOP.

Beachwood's chapter, Lodge 88, was established in 1974 under a group of founding fathers that included former Mayor Merle Gorden, who is once again an active member.

"We set examples of how citizens can assist in making law enforcement better in our city, state, and country," Merle told us. "Our non-political membership includes people from all walks of life and we're actively looking to expand our base." Merle had moved to Beachwood in 1959, became a volunteer firefighter in 1973, and then recruited about 20 people to start the Beahwood FOPA chapter in 1974. When he became mayor, he stepped aside because his leadership became a conflict of interest.

Over the years, membership declined and as the chapter reaches its 50-year anniversary, it is now being rebuilt under a new leadership team: Rob Marimberga, president; Sheldon Lichtman, vice president; Jeffrey Schneider, treasurer; and David Keilin, secretary.

"Many people in our community don't even know we exist," said Rob, who was recently elected president. "With changing times, we know the dangers and difficulties faced by today's police officers and we want to get more people involved. Our ultimate goal is to rally community involvement to support Beachwood police officers in times of need. We hold meetings every other month and welcome new members' participation.

"We are here to support our parent FOP lodge and work closely with the Beachwood Police Department," he added. "It's a winwin for the people of Beachwood."

In addition to scheduled meetings, Beachwood's FOPA and FOP chapters plan to host various fundraisers in the community, as well as dinners that will feature keynote speakers at local restaurants. The group's next meeting, open to the community, will take place Monday, Nov. 6, 6:30 pm, at Olive Garden.

FOPA Lodge 88 works directly with FOP Lodge 86, whose president is Beachwood Police Officer Maxwell Zugay. Both are sanctioned by the State of Ohio.





Surgery, Close to Home

/ith the opening of University Hospitals Ahuja Medical Center's new surgical suites, patients enjoy the comfort and convenience of general and specialized surgical procedures, close to home.

While most hospitals have advanced medical equipment, often it is the little touches that make for an exceptional patient experience. So, when University Hospitals Ahuja Medical Center designed its Phase 2 expansion, the architects brought together a multidisciplinary team of physicians, nurses and staff members to perceive the space from all perspectives—and to especially be mindful of patients.

"As part of the expansion, we have increased our operating room capacity at UH Ahuja Medical Center by 80%. The addition of eight new surgical suites brings the total number to 18," says Dr. Meagan Costedio, who, along with Dr. Sandhia Varyani, is co-chair of the division of surgery.

Initially, four operating rooms will open and allow for expanded surgical and endoscopy services, including more orthopedic, general and gynecology services.

Both Drs. Costedio and Varyani were part of the team that worked with architects to give input for the design of the facility, configure the bed and equipment layout for best function, and even help pick the colors and furniture.

"Even though you are in an operating room, we want to make it as pleasant as possible," says Dr. Varyani, who has worked at University Hospitals for 20 years specializing in OB-GYN and minimally invasive procedures. "It's not just about the advanced technology and lighting in the room. We also focus on the patient experience, so there are things like TV screens with a picture of a beach and sounds of waves that calm you before you go to sleep."

"As part of the renovation, we also have a wonderful waiting area catering to families," Dr. Costedio adds. "There is comfortable seating if you want to relax and computer charging areas if you need to be able to work.

"Plus, we have a meditation room downstairs," she notes. "We are a patient- and family-centric facility, whether you are getting a surgical procedure, having a baby or getting a mammogram."

The expansion design not only focused on patients and their families, but also took into account the staff and being mindful of the workday. There is a lot of natural light streaming in the operating room staff lounge, instead of the customary fluorescent lights overhead.

The surgery center's new Central Sterile Processing area, which cleans, sterilizes and prepares medical instruments, is located in the basement and features decorative glass walls. From an infection prevention standpoint, the walls are not only easy to clean, but also give the team an opportunity to customize their work environment with picturesque landscape images. By diversifying its surgical footprint in the new 51,000-square-foot Surgery Center, UH Ahuja Medical Center will be able to offer more complex surgeries in the future.

"I knew my business model of providing safe and reliable transportation for families and children in Northeast Ohio was needed, and my goal was to be even better prepared to start up again when the time was right," she said. "Busy parents will always need flexible and convenient transportation for school runs and extracurricular activities."

Now, with the 2023-24 school year in full swing, Charisma has jumpstarted her app-based transportation business with the goal of acquiring 150 subscribers and 50 drivers. The annual membership cost is \$20 a month, with a base charge of \$10 per ride and \$1 per mile. Carpooling is permitted to allow families to split the fare. "Members go through background checks before they are allowed to join and access the driver app," said Charisma. "This is a perfect job for retired teachers and other professionals who want to help fill the gap in transportation resources for families with school age children," Charisma added.

Charisma's current staff consists of four dedicated managers, each in charge of transportation, logistics, safety, and human resources. "After the next funding round I'm hiring additional staff to boost customer support services and enhance our technology," she said.

With safety being Charisma's paramount concern, the company's safety manager is a former police officer who thoroughly vets and regulates each of her drivers. Applicants must go through multiple background checks and have professional and personal references. The cars being used to transport students also undergo intense scrutiny. "We have a partnership with Firestone, where each car used for transporting students undergoes a 22-point safety inspection," Charisma said.

With slots for the school year filling up quickly, Charisma said her biggest challenge remains finding enough drivers to meet the demand. "This is a perfect job for retired teachers and other professionals who want to help fill the gap in transportation resources for families with school age

children," Charisma added.

Vicki Primes is grateful for the ride service. "My grandson rides with a Parent Network Driver for after school pick up at Menlo Park Academy," she said. "I leave work right when he gets out of school. It helps so much."

Looking to the future, Charisma plans to keep the drive alive and expand to other Ohio cities. "There is a vast, untapped market of working parents who need this service," said Charisma. "My goal is to fill that need in the safest and most seamless way possible so that parents have a hasslefree way to transport their kids where they need to go."

About Helen Wilson

Helen's love of all things botanical began at a young age, as she grew up in Southern California, playing daily in her grandmother's lush garden. Her art career began as a middle school student doodling on cereal boxes, gum wrappers and phone books. At age 16, she was introduced to the wonders of a Rapidograph technical pen, spent hours drawing, and found art to be a means of communication. Entering into adulthood and the world of work and family life, she set her artistic interests aside.

Several decades later, Helen and her family moved to the edge of the Cuyahoga Valley National Park, her fascination with the natural world was rekindled, and she discovered a fascination with the relationship between "outer and inner." The dormancy of winter plants, the buzzing of pollinators, the hidden work of chlorophyll, the rhythm of the seasons, the mystery of seeds, and the amazing world of grasses became some of her themes. The infinite layers found in nature are a common thread throughout her mixed media process. She also recognizes that the botanical world has a message for us. There is more to life than meets the eye!

Helen discovered her voice in mixed media after experimenting with varied artistic approaches. She devised her own process of 3-D paper collage, also considered as a low relief sculpture. She uses acrylic paints, mediums, inks, monoprinting, sgraffito, and metal leaf in her work, and includes asemic writing and numbers as a means of giving voice to the botanical world. Recently, she began to create free-standing paper assemblages and is currently learning how to incorporate recycled cardboard into some of her pieces.

Stop the Hate Contest Open for Submissions 6th-12th Graders Invited to Submit Essays on Stopping the Spread of Hate

The Maltz Museum's 16th Annual Stop the Hate Contest and Program has officially launched for the 2023/2024 school year. Each year, approximately 8,000 students participate in the Stop the Hate program through workshops and tours and about 3,000 students enter the prestigious contest. With the help of 400 volunteer readers, 26 contest finalists, 35+ schools, and two Stop the Hate teachers of the year are named. Through the generosity of a donor, \$100,000 is awarded in support of standing up and speaking out against hate. To the best of the Maltz Museum's knowledge, the Stop the Hate program is one of the country's largest scholarship opportunities of its kind.

Who are the students who are participating?

Northeast Ohio 6th through 12th graders living in or attending public, private, or home school in one of the following twelve counties: Ashtabula, Cuyahoga, Geauga, Lake, Lorain, Mahoning, Medina, Portage, Stark, Summit, Trumbull, and Wayne counties.

Since the contest started, over 50,000 students in these twelve counties have participated and \$1.5 million has been awarded in the form of scholarships, prizes, and anti-bias education grants.

Rooted in the Jewish value of respect for all humanity, the Maltz Museum is proud that it continues to give young people of all faiths and backgrounds a platform to speak out in support of inclusion and diversity, while also supporting continued education in classrooms through grant-making.

How can a student enter the Stop the Hate contest?

Students are invited to pen a personal essay in 500 words or less about bias they have witnessed or experienced, and share what they have done or will do in response. A visit to the museum is recommended. However, if distance is a barrier, there is a digital Stop the Hate tour that can be accessed online at Learn.MaltzMuseum. org and classrooms can schedule a virtual Holocaust Survivor Speaker. Although encouraged, there is no requirement to attend with a school or as part of a group. Essays can be submitted by an individual independent of their school's involvement.

How can a teacher bring a school group for a Stop the Hate tour?

School groups are invited at a discounted rate of only \$3 per student. Secondary

add-on experiences are an additional \$2 per student. One adult is admitted free with every 10 students. CMSD schools are admitted at no cost, with pre-registration. Please schedule with a minimum notice of two weeks. The museum also offers free transportation for CMSD schools as well as any school with 50% or more of its students participating in the National School Lunch Program. Stop the Hate tours are approximately 60 minutes in length and can be paired with additional museum offerings. Teachers can choose from having their students meet and talk with a Holocaust survivor and hear a harrowing story of survival and courage; experience how high-tech A.I. intersects with the preservation of historical memory when witnessing the Interactive Biographies of Holocaust Survivor Stanley Bernath or Civil Rights Leader Rev. Dr. Otis Moss Jr.; or participate in a docent led tour of the special exhibition The Girl in the Diary: Searching for Rywka from the Lodz Ghetto, which opens October 25, 2023.


Are there other ways for schools to get involved?

A classroom-based group competition invites classes to tour the museum and then participate in a free workshop with Roots of American Music. Working with a teaching artist, the class will pen an original song. This song becomes the class submission to the contest and is judged by a panel of music experts selected in partnership with the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame. Classroom songs are recorded for future listening! Winning classrooms will receive anti-bias education grants for their school.

In addition, classroom teachers may elect to have essay writing workshops through teaching artists from Lake Erie Ink that guide students through the essay writing process.

New this year is the opportunity to pen poems, in addition to essays, however poems are exclusively accessible for Lake Erie Workshop students.

Also new this year is the opportunity to apply for one of three Stop the Hate Anti-Bias Community Grants of \$5,000 each for schools in the participating 12 counties. For more information on applications, please contact ckrieger@mmjh.org.

Are there words of inspiration to get students thinking?

"I no longer believe that we can change anything in the world until we have first changed ourselves." – Etty Hillesum

Etty Hillesum was a young, Jewish-Dutch woman who wrote diaries in Amsterdam during the Second World War. In 1943, she was murdered at Auschwitz, at only 29 years old. Etty believed internal personal change was a necessary first step to bringing about positive change in the world, and that this was the main lesson to be learned from the Holocaust. Etty bears witness to what it means to be human and commits herself to a radical choice: not to hate, even as she opens her heart to the horrors unfolding around her.

In honor of Etty's message, we ask students to share their stories; to describe a moment of injustice, bias, discrimination, or exclusion: something they witnessed or experienced, or a time when they learned about an unjust situation or event that affected you or others.

Students are asked to answer the following questions: How did this moment impact the people involved? What kind of personal change does this experience inspire in you?

How can your personal change lead you to make positive changes in your community and the world? How have you or will you affect others positively?

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





hen asked about his experience at the Peter B. Lewis Aquatic Therapy Center, the first thing Marty Goren says is, "I'll tell you one thing: Eran is unbelievable."

"I've been going regularly for over a year and I thoroughly enjoy it. It's great to see other people who are going through similar things. It's easy to get appointments and the staff is very accommodating."

After a knee replacement, Marty had home therapy and then went to the Center for aquatic therapy. Now he's happy to be able to get around without a walker or a cane. "I walk a lot. My personal record is almost 11,000 steps in a day. I walk after breakfast, then again with my wife in the afternoon."

Marty and his wife, Lil, recently celebrated their 72nd anniversary and live independently in Beachwood.

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
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Find Your Voice Now

Annie Roth found her voice and now helps other women find theirs. Find Your Voice Now, a nonprofit organization founded by Annie and Mary Ellen Bartlett, supports women in toxic relationships: Women who are feeling unheard and alone, and are searching for the



strength to believe in themselves. Its mission is, "To create a network of women to help support and navigate through emotionally abusive relationships and to discover their own voice: to offer a safe space to become empowered to live their healthiest and happiest of lives."
